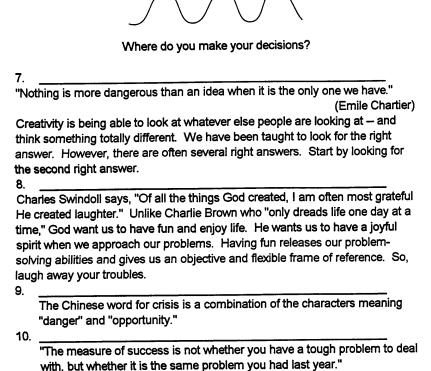

Getting emotionally hooked is one of the easiest, most common, and most dangerous facets of problem solving. None of us is immune to it. You are 'hooked" when you don't really care about the problem any more; you simply want to satisfy your feelings.
