nce again, God's promises were true. Baby Jesus was born just as God's Word had said. "Out of Bethlehem," the prophet Micah had written 700 years before (Micah 5:2). And that was where Mary and Joseph were when Jesus was born.

Because many others had also traveled to Bethlehem, all the inns and hotels were full. And so it was that Jesus was born in a stable. Mary wrapped Him in cloths

and gently laid Him in a manger on a bed of hay. A strange birthplace for the King of the universe!


